Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Grace and Peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ!

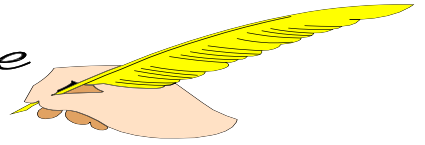
The focus of Jesus' teaching in the Gospel of Matthew, Chapter six, is on doing all the right things, for all the wrong reasons, and how that can diminish the rightness of the right actions. In that Gospel, Jesus advises piety, but not for the reason of being praised by others. Jesus advises prayer, but not for the reason of impressing others. Jesus advises fasting, but not for the reason of showing off to others. Of course, Jesus lived in a different day and age than we do. We may feel inclined to show off our new houses, our new cars, or our new clothes, but we rarely feel the reward of showing off our piety. If anything, Jesus might counsel us to be a bit more public than we are with our piety, so that others might learn from us. In this day and age, religious fervor is not a show off sort of thing; showing off is not likely to motivate us to greater piety.

The question for us then is why do we practice spiritual discipline during Lent? Let me give you several answers: we practice spiritual disciplines more at Lent than at other times because it is traditional. We grew up doing it. We practice spiritual disciplines during Lent because we feel we ought to. We practice spiritual disciplines during Lent because we're either hopeful of wracking up a few extra points with God if we do, or we're fearful of getting a few extra demerits from God if we don't. We practice spiritual disciplines during Lent because that practice marks what "tribe" we're in – we're Christians and moreover, we're more than Christians – Easter Christians. We practice spiritual disciplines during Lent because it makes us feel like better Christians than the Christians who are Christians in name only.

Some of these reasons for practicing spiritual disciplines during Lent are not all that bad. I'm one who thinks there's nothing wrong with doing something, just because we ought to do it. But something tells me that Jesus would tell us that we're missing the boat if we practice spiritual disciplines during Lent, or at any other time of year, for any reason save one.

Jesus clearly felt that there was a reward to be had if people practiced spiritual disciplines for the RIGHT reason. He warned that we wouldn't get our

reward from God if we practice these disciplines for the wrong reason. It seems, furthermore that getting this reward is the only reason we should be practicing the disciplines.

So what is the reward? It is a close walk with God. Reconciling ourselves to God is the only reason that makes sense for practicing the spiritual disciplines. Note that God has already reconciled Himself to us. It is we, ourselves, who get in the way. We're too busy reconciling our bank accounts, most of the time, to pay much attention to reconciling ourselves to God. So we miss out on the relationship. That's the reward for the spiritual disciplines. The reward – the absolutely wonderful, stupendous, knock-you-off-your-feet reward for practicing spiritual disciplines is that we suddenly know God. We know God. That's a whole lot different from hearing tell about God. We KNOW God. Knowing God is as different from knowing about God, as knowing a friend is – from merely hearing about a person.

The incredible message of the Gospel is that God really, really wants to be in a honest-to-goodness relationship with us. The incredible message of the Gospel is that God has cleared away all the barriers to that relationship, except one. That one exception is our free will. God will not override our free will, in order to force the relationship.

So practice spiritual disciplines during Lent, and let that practice be for the right reason. Let the practice of spiritual disciplines during Lent be only the beginning, the training for the practice of those disciplines through the rest of the year, and through the rest of life, so that for the rest of life, we may have a relationship with God.

I urge you then to attend our weekly worship services this season. But, don't attend them just because you should. Attend them because you want to be open to that lifelong relationship with God, that God wants so much for us to have!!!

IN JANUARY, DESPITE THE COLD & SNOW, DIG WE MUST OUTSIDE THE CHURCH

The snow was no obstacle for Absolute Tank Removal's crew. They worked their plan to abandon our old, underground Oil Storage Tank in an environmentally sound manner. Their work consisted of pumping out the residual oil, washing down the inside of the tank, removing all piping, taking soil samples from below the tank, filling the tank with a solid polymer foam and backfilling the hole; phew! Since then, the laboratory test results of the soil samples confirm there was no contamination. The Trustees were concerned the 1970's era tank was at the end of its useful life and a potential pollution source should it develop a leak. This was the right time to do this since we had been using natural gas as our only fuel source for some time. Gas is a cheaper fuel than oil and expected to stay less expensive for the foreseeable future.

Staff Parish Relations Committee prepares for Taka's Retirement Transition ahead at Golden Hill with new pastor arriving in July

By now you have received Taka's letter announcing and relating the reasons for his retirement at the end of June. It is with great sadness and regret that the SPRC accept his notice of intent.

First, let me assure you that this was solely Taka's decision, not SPRC, the District Superintendent, the Bishop, or anything that we did as a congregation that affected his decision. As you may recall, Taka had back surgery prior to the start of his ministry at Golden Hill, and those of us who have been around him for extended periods of time can see the obvious pain he is in from being in one position for too long.

We respect his decision, and are happy that after 30 something years in ministry he can retire, and hopefully get into a daily routine that will allow him to exercise regularly and relieve him of some of the pain.

Taka has accomplished much in the short time that he's been here. He has demonstrated strong leadership, which had gotten us to a place where he facilitated us making the tough decisions in order to make the necessary repairs to the church. We are disappointed that he will not be here to see the completion of the work he started, but hopefully he will be able to attend the consecration of the completed renovation. Knowing Taka, he will track the progress on our website.

The Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) will work with the District Superintendent and the Bishop to select a new appointee who will be a good fit for Golden Hill. We require a pastor who can keep a steady hand on the wheel as we forge ahead with the major renovation project, and at the same time continuing and strengthening our ministries. We will keep you fully informed of any development in the appointment of Taka's successor, and keep you apprised of the progress and plans for a retirement event for him as well.

It is understandable that you may have questions, concerns and comments. Please do not

hesitate to address them to me, any member of the committee or Taka.

The SPRC Committee members are Barbara Stinson, Roena Littlejohn, Pam Hoffman, John Machledt, Reginald Roberts, June Sibley-Prusak, Allen Corry, and Isabel Trudeau.

As we prepare for yet another transition, we ask that you pray for Taka and his wife, Jeannette as they get ready to retire from active ministry. Please pray for Golden Hill and each and everyone of us that we will continue to be strong, and not falter in our support of the church and our service to the Lord.
