From the PC of Pastor B



“The joy that I have the world didn’t give it to me and the world can’t take it away.”

The first time I heard these lyrics from a contemporary gospel song was at the funeral. It was a service of worship and thanksgiving celebrating the life of the Rev. Dr. Lenton Gunn, senior pastor of the Third Presbyterian Church in Harlem.

The congregation was grief stricken by the sudden death of their pastor. However, when the choir began to sing this song (one of his favorites) the church almost rocked off its foundation with pure joy and thanksgiving. The service moved quickly to one of celebration and pure joy.

In the midst of death you can create joy was the message for the people gathered that day. Indeed, scripture tells us mourning will endure only for a moment because joy comes in the morning.

It is hard sometimes to understand this. With the ever changing stock market people are getting nervous. My neighbors at the Inwood are very concerned about social security and their pension funds. Most of the people living in my complex are retired and the past few weeks have led to many a sleepless night for some. Bad financial news abounds. While on vacation my host was constantly running to the library to check the stock market. A day trader, he would return to the

beach cottage depressed. I on the other hand was thankful to be at my “beach paradise” joyful and hopeful. There are spiritual practices of prosperity that never change regardless of the present economy.

There is a wonderful song from the film “The Preacher’s Wife”...*Hold on Help Is on the Way*. I found myself humming the lyrics this past week. Although I am concerned with the present economy, I am not distressed. Why, simply this, “In God I Trust.” The last time we went through this the general board of pensions of the United Methodist Church told us in a financial planning seminar...don’t worry...don’t look...we have never gone under. Strong words but when you think about it didn’t Jesus tell us not to worry? So I’m going to hold on because help is always on the way. After all none of us is truly prosperous until we learn how to be generous. Too many of us look at what we have lost as opposed to what we have. Count your blessings.

To whom much is given much more is expected should be a fact of life. So have faith people. This too shall pass. We sit on a golden hill. “Put not your trust in earthly princes” ...trust in the Lord.”

You are invited Sept 11 to Families & Friends Sunday

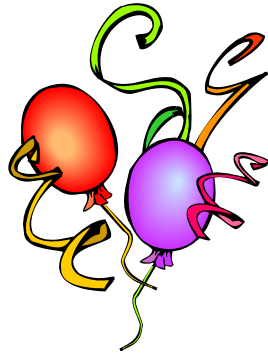
You are invited to join us in worship and to a time of fellowship with us immediately after our 10:30 AM worship service on September 11th, as we celebrate Families & Friends Sunday.

When Becki Anderson asked me to write about why I am part of the **Christmas Baskets** and **Weekenders** ministries at Golden Hill, my first thought was, "What does that have to do with stewardship?"

I know I began working with these programs because I liked the practicality of delivering God's love regularly through food and gifts. I have continued to be part of both because I believe that people should not be hungry and that Christmas is an important time for the sharing of God's gifts.

Lo and behold, Webster's Ninth New Collegiate Dictionary says that a steward is "...someone who provides food and drink..." and that stewardship includes "the responsibility of a person to manage his life ...with proper regard for the rights of others." OK, both programs do fit with those definitions. We are providing food and drinks both in our backpacks and in our Christmas Baskets. With both, we recognize that in the abundance God has granted to us, we cannot lose sight of the right of all God's children to enjoy that abundance. The foods in both Weekenders backpacks and Christmas baskets, and the gifts in the Christmas Baskets, are a small step in that direction.

When I started to write an article on Weekenders for the September Tower, what came out were the words of the pledge we make when we join the church, to support the church with our prayers, our presence, our gifts, our service and our witness. Weekenders and Christmas Baskets embody all those things so clearly.

I thank Becki for starting me thinking about stewardship in a new way, and realizing that Golden Hill's ministries are one voice of our stewardship.

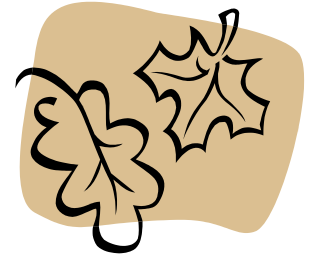

Weekenders Program Starts a New School Year at Longfellow School

- With your donations of single-serving foods that children can prepare easily. We will also need to replace a number of backpacks, so if you see a good sale, please buy what you can!
- With your service: in addition to all of the above, if you know a group who might sponsor a food drive for Weekenders, please let UMW know.
- With your witness: Children should not go hungry. The Weekenders Program embodies Christ's commandment to tend his lambs and feed his sheep. You honor that teaching every time you bring in food, donate a backpack, or help with planning and packing.

Our grocery lists are geared to each week's menu, so sometimes we need a large number of servings of something, pretty quickly. We'd like to cut down on the need to shop by building up an inventory. Here is a list of foods we use regularly. When you're shopping, if you can pick up a few of these items, they will accumulate without anyone having to buy a lot at a time.

And here's the list!

- Individual boxes of cold cereal
- Individual packets of hot cereal
- Granola Bars
- Pop Tarts
- Individual puddings
- Individual fruit cups
- Individual applesauce (either plain or fruit flavored)
- 6-ounce juice boxes
- Crystal Light or other brands of powdered juice to add to water
- Mac and cheese—cups or packets or boxes
- Pasta with tomato sauce and meat: individual or 13-ounce size
- Rice with meat
- Hash in cans: individual or 13-ounce
- Chili: 13 ounce
- Vegetables: individual sized cans
- Tuna fish: 3 or 5-6 ounce cans
- Chicken: 3 or 5-6 ounce cans
- Stew: microwave flat packs or 13 ounce cans
- Vienna sausage
- Ramen noodles: cups or packets
- Microwave popcorn
- Canned soups

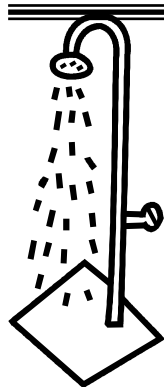


New Outreach Ministry at Golden Hill

The Rose Window Stewardship Campaign for 2012

The Rose Window Stewardship Campaign for 2012 got off to an aggressive start. Our total for the first three months as of July 31 is **\$8700**, twenty percent of the \$40,000 goal by December 2012. The summer months were expected to be slow but its time to pick up the pace. Phase one of the stain glass restoration is over fifty percent completed. Before you know it we'll be looking at our beautiful restored stained glass windows and the choir will not have to worry about getting wet with rain drops after the ceiling is repaired. We want to financially help by keeping the restoration progress going strong during the next phase with contributions towards the Rose Window Campaign.

This campaign has another 17 months and it continues to look like we are on the way to reaching our goal and even more. These funds will financially assist in the Church's renovation project by funding the Rose Window restoration in the next phase of the Golden Hill UMC stained glass window restoration in 2012.

Remember your name will be placed on a plaque based on your contribution.

The plaque will be installed in the Narthex. The donation categories will be Bronze - \$350, Silver - \$750 (2 names), Gold - \$1500 (3 names) and Platinum - \$3000 and up (5 names). The number of names inscribed on the plaque are also determined by the amount of the gift. The contribution envelopes provided with the symbol of the Rose Window, can be found behind the pews for your Rose Window Campaign donation.



You can keep track of the monthly updates on the Rose Window Campaign board in the Narthex. We ask that you continue to gracefully prepare your hearts as we join together as a church to aid and support this campaign in bringing Golden Hill UMC back to its original state and condition by placing your contributions in the Rose Window envelopes provided for you behind the church pews or on the table in the back of the church. Please remember the Rose window campaign is in addition to our normal tithes and offering pledges.

Golden Hill Building Restoration Progress Report from the Trustees

The “Tower Restoration” Phase of our “Building Restoration” Project has progressed steadily, through periods of both good and bad weather. The scaffolding and blue netting that continue to surround the Tower has made it difficult to see the work that has been accomplished.

At mid-August, all masonry repointing, repairs, and waterproofing has been completed. Tower roofing installations have also been completed and brings us to a point of approximately 70% of the exterior work being complete. The interior work is approximately 15% complete with the stained glass windows removed for restoration and the removal of the damaged plaster, around the windows.

Within the next two weeks the upper sections of the exterior scaffolding will be removed and the lower sections reconfigured to permit work to start

on the flashing where the sidewalls of the Tower meet the adjoining roof areas.

We are on schedule and expect to complete the exterior work in October.

Interior work in the Chancel will become more active through the months of September and October, but at this time a completion target is dependent on the rate at which the damaged plaster areas become dry enough to permit repairs.

Plans for the next phase of the restoration project are under discussion with a firm proposal being targeted for early October.
